Acting as a Commissioner for Oaths, Notary Public or otherwise witnessing documents

Purpose:	To advise barristers regarding their ability act as a Commissioner for Oaths, Notary Public and related matters.
Scope of application:	All practising barristers

Commissioner for Oaths

1. The “administration of oaths” is a reserved legal activity under the Legal Services Act 2007 (sections 12). Such activities may only be carried out by authorised or exempt persons (section 13).
2. rS67 of the BSB Handbook states that every practising certificate issued to a barrister shall authorise the barrister to undertake the administration of oaths. Therefore, barristers with practising certificates are permitted to act as Commissioners for Oaths.
3. Barristers without practising certificates are unable to act as a Commissioner for Oaths. Section 14 of the 2007 Act effectively makes it a criminal offence for you to undertake reserved legal activities without a current practising certificate. Barristers

who are not sure whether they are entitled to a practising certificate should consult the BSB Handbook rS57 - rS68.

4. These provisions came into force on 1 January 2010 (SI 2009/3250). If you were called to the Bar before 1 January 2010, you were advised that you were entitled to administer an oath and that this did not depend on whether you had a right of audience or a practising certificate. This position has changed.

5. The core duties and other relevant provisions of the BSB Handbook apply whenever a barrister is carrying out reserved legal activities.

Notary Public

6. The ability to act as a Notary Public is a separate qualification, regulated by the Faculty Office of the Archbishop of Canterbury under the direction of the Master of the Faculties. This qualification is not given to you by virtue of the Legal Services Act 2007, or otherwise by the Bar Standards Board. Witnessing documents

7. Ultimately, it is a legal question as to whether what you are being asked to do constitutes “administering an oath” under the Act or is otherwise permitted. Therefore, if in any doubt you should seek appropriate legal advice before doing so.
